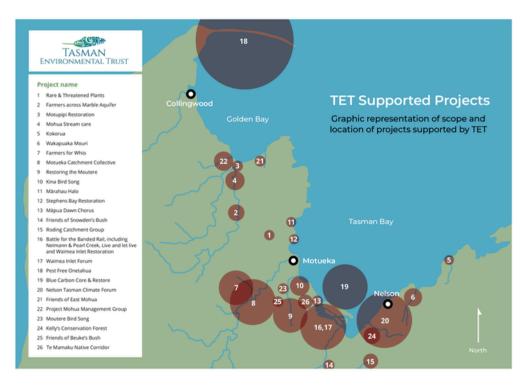

Our community projects

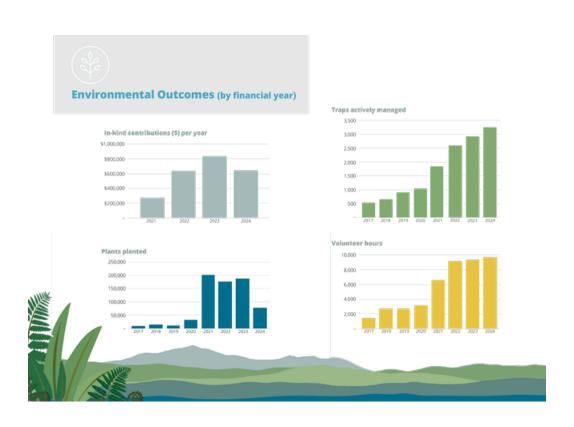

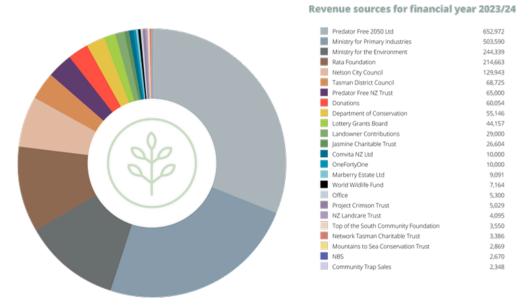


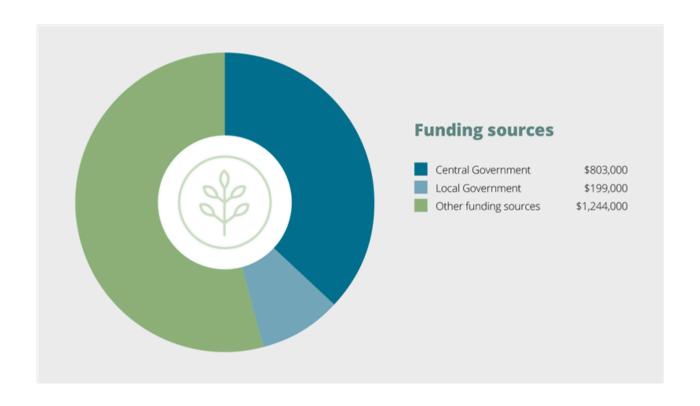


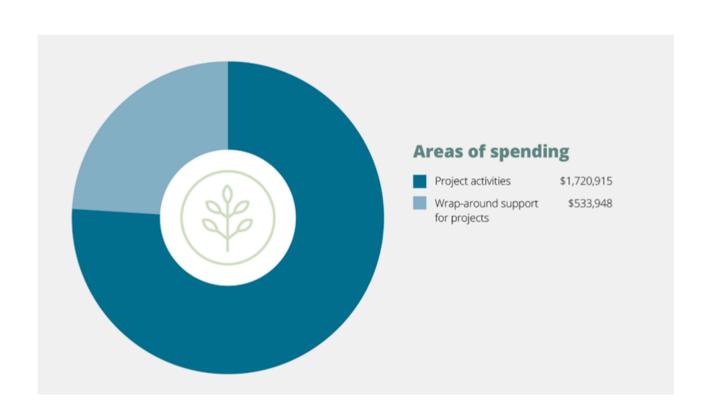
The year in numbers

Entity's Purpose or Mission

Our vision is to have healthy, diverse ecosystems woven through the Nelson Tasman landscape. Our mission is to connect people to nature conservation in their communities.

Entity Structure

Tasman Environmental Trust currently has six trustees that constitute the governance board. Staff employed to administer and promote affairs of the Trust include a Chief Executive, Financial Manager, Strategic and Fundraising Lead, Operations Manager, Communications Lead and Predator Free Activator.

Main Sources of Entity's Cash and Resources

Funding was received from central government; New Zealand Forest Service with Ministry of Primary Industries, Ministry for the Environment, and DOC Community Fund. Grants from other entities included Predator Free 2050 Limited, Predator Free NZ Trust, Rata Foundation, Nelson City Council, Tasman District Council, Jasmine Charitable Trust, Lottery Grants Board, The Nature Conservancy NZ Trust and Project Crimson Trust.

Main Methods Used by Entity to Raise Fund

Tasman Environmental Trust makes applications to organisations for grants. The majority of funding is by way of grants and donations.

Entity's Reliance on Volunteers and Donated Goods or Services

The Trustees are volunteers in their capacity as Trustees. Tasman Environmental Trust does not rely on volunteers for day-to-day operations. Volunteers support us with our various nature conservation activities throughout the year.

Statement of Accounting Policies

'How did we do our accounting?'

The reporting entity is Tasman Environmental Trust, a charitable organization registered under the Charities Act 2005. These financial statements are presented for the year ended 30 June 2025. These financial statements presented in accordance with Tier 3 NFP.

The Financial Statements have been approved and were authorised for issue by the Trustees on the date specified on page 5

Basis of Preparation

The entity is permitted by law to apply the Tier 3 (NFP) Standard issued by the External Reporting Board (XRB) and has elected to do so. A PBE may apply the standard if it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses less than or equal to \$5,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The entity is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income Tax

Tasman Environmental Trust is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. Policies have been applied on a consistent basis with those of the previous reporting period.

Recognition and measurement

Items of property, plant and equipment are initially measured at cost.

Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset such as materials and direct labour, costs directly attributable to bringing the assets to a working condition for their intended purpose. Parts of property, plant and equipment that have different useful lives are counted for as separate items.

Purchased software that is integral to the functionality of related equipment is capitalised as part of that equipment. Any gain or loss on disposal of property, plant and equipment is recognised in the statement of comprehensive revenue and expense.

Subsequent expenditure

Subsequent expenditure is capitalised only when it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the Trust. Ongoing repairs and maintenance is expenses as incurred.

Depreciation

Depreciation is recognised in the statements of comprehensive revenue and expense on a diminishing value and straight line basis over the estimated useful lives of each item of property, plant and equipment. The diminishing value and straight line rates used are:

Motor Vehicles: 21% SL

Plant and Equipment: 8% - 67% DV Office Equipment: 13% - 50% DV Software and Applications: 50% DV

Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at reporting date and adjusted if appropriate.

Tasman Environmental Trust entered into an agreement to lease premises at 4 Buxton Lane, Takaka. The lease commenced on the 24th April 2023 for an initial period of 1 year with rights of renewal for one year. The lease was renegotiated in November 2024. The final expiry date is 9th December 2027. The annual rental expense is \$14,300 plus GST.

Tasman Environmental Trust entered into an agreement to lease premises at 237 Queen Street, Richmond. The lease commenced on the 1st March 2022 for an initial period of 2 years with rights of renewal for two of two years each. The final expiry date is 28th February 2028. The annual rent is \$26,200 plus GST.
